General Discussion	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mr. Patterson started the conversation by thanking the group for all their hard work the past couple of years. CCCHD has recently submitted the first round of paperwork for accreditation to the National Accreditation Board and the Chronic Disease Task Force has fit so well into accreditation. Main Focus: Where are we in each of the different subgroups and the challenges that the groups may be facing in particular the funding challenges? The Community Health Foundation has opened up their grant cycle and all applications are due at the beginning of the year (Please see email attached). Community Health Improvement plan will be extended for 3.5 years due to new state regulations that have been put in place. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Task Forces to focus on the challenges they are facing and to prepare to submit a proposal for funding. CCCHD will help write any proposals for funding.
Congestive Heart Failure	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Congestive Heart Failure (M. Potina) – Pilot has been put in place at the Fairfield Hospital and has had much success with readmission and connection with patients. SRMC to look at the process Fairfield Hospital took to make this such a great success. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> RHC to give Lindsey an update on CHF Task Force Mercy to get statistics on readmissions on CHF
Diabetes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> SRMC has not added on RHC as a multi-site due to not having an employee to oversee the process. Diabetes at RHC has been pushed back due to opening up other services to RHC patients. Time management seems to be a concern with this topic. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> M. Hemphill to speak with L. Saunders about helping out so that we can continue to move forward. RHC to decide whether to move forward as an independent site.
Asthma	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Asthma group is doing very well on getting additional partners to join the group. There are monthly meeting in place to speak with Head Start and school nurses regarding the Asthma program. Clark County Pharmacists have invited Anne to attend their meeting to speak about Asthma. Challenge for the group is trying to get more supplies (mattress covers, pillow case covers, etc). 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Anne to attend monthly meetings when possible Anne to provide translated pamphlets to community partners. Anne to apply for a Community Health Foundation Grant to purchase more supplies.
Oral Health	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> RHC dental clinic will be opening for services for RHC patients only at this time. They have currently hired a local Dentist, Mark Duffy, who has come back to serve Clark County residents. The challenge for this group is to get the current City Commission to place fluoridation on the May ballot. Community Health Foundation continues to do work on oral health including Healthy 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mr. Patterson to meet with City Manager/City Commission regarding ballot CHF to continue to do community outreach and educate the public about oral health.

Oral Health (cont.)	Smiles Program. Community outreach is in place to non-dental providers to educate about oral health.	
Tobacco	<p><u>T21</u> – Conducted Surveys in New Carlisle July-August. From this survey, they received 84 responses. T21 presentation is scheduled to be given to New Carlisle City Council on February 5, 2018.</p> <p><u>Smoke Free Policy</u> – Policy has been drafted and reviewed by attorneys. The open comment period extends through November 15, 2017. The next phase will include revising agreements and then to be reviewed by legal. Updates will be provided in the next task force meeting. The policy is projected to be implemented by July 1, 2018 in Clark County with full enforcement required by August 3, 2018.</p> <p><u>Smoke Free Open Space</u> – Smoke free open spaces will not specifically fund this work in 2018. Community support will need to be recruited to meeting program needs in 2018. Please provide recommendations to Elle on options/suggestions from your agency.</p> <p><u>STAND</u> – Two stand groups will be managed by the Tobacco grant for the 2017-2018 school year. Recruitment is underway at SHS and CTC. The goal is to have over 20 students sign up at both schools. The plan for future campaigns include social media, Kick Butts Day (March 21, 2018) and 10-15 compliance checks completed during this grant year.</p> <p><u>Springfield School District Smoke Free Policy</u> Policy is currently 100% tobacco free. Enforcement and communication of policy is needed. Dr. Hill, SCS District Superintendent, is excited about enforcing the policy through signage and collaboration with stand groups. More updates will be provided after the next school board meeting.</p>
