They are drawing families in, which is their focus, but the closing of Many Pathways is affecting the recovering addicts. • More advertising and cards for distribution coming soon. • Suggested that Conversation 4 Change be held on Tuesday when FOA is open for other activities. 	
Data Collection Committee Update	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Data Collection Committee is working with Tracey on the Collective Impact project. • Shane Grey, GIS system, is meeting with Lisa D. regarding what data needs to be included in the GIS system. The Next step is actually entering the desired data into the system. 	
Cardinal Health and DFC Grants	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cardinal Health Grant application to fund a Coalition Coordinator has been acknowledged, but they have more questions that need to be answered. Want another tactic regarding training physicians to use pain management other than pain medications. 	

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Drug Free Community Grant is up for application again. We did not get last year do we want to reapply this year. Application last year required us to alter our mission in order to apply and the grant is very focused on prevention. May interfere with other objectives and goals. Consensus is to not apply this time around and to apply our energies to the Collective Impact project instead. 	
<p>Community Collective Impact Model 4 Change (CCIM4C)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Tracy S. and Amanda L. presented an overview of CCIM4C. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ CCIM4C offers direction and structure for the Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Coalition. It is proposed that we align the substance abuse subcommittees around the categories in the future with a defined goal of peeling back the layers to find the causal factors of the current crisis that our community faces. ✓ Collective Impact is a data informed process and consists of five conditions: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Common Agenda b. Shared Measurement c. Mutually Reinforcing d. Continuous Communication e. Backbone (Shared Model) ✓ Collective Impact is a framework to bring systems within a community together. It is comprised of a Theory of Change under which 6 categories/committees state the areas of focus in relation to strategic planning: Demand Reduction, Supply Reduction, Overdose Death Prevention, Treatment (including medication-assisted treatment (MAT), Recovery Support, and BHAG – Big Hairy Audacious Goal. See attached handout. ✓ BHAG is the overreaching goal. A goal based on peeling back of the layers looking to determine root causes and goals to address, i.e., trauma, inability to cope. ✓ The categories guide the data collection – see handout ✓ Mutual Reinforcement activities that are reflective for the 6 categories must be conducted. ✓ Consists of ongoing measurements – does not wait until the end to determine if the plans/goals are showing results. ✓ It works thru boards within the community. ✓ Backbone support system is needed. Locally that will be Mental Health, Health Department, Community Health Foundation and United Way. ✓ Deliverables are due by the end of May ✓ The next component, data collection, deadline is February 23, 2018. ✓ There must be a shared agenda along with shared data to show an evidence of need. Late data submissions will be accepted for future use. ✓ What stakeholders/voices are missing? Need public/community representation. ✓ Determine how to have difficult conversations. ✓ This framework once learned can be used to address other significant concerns that our community may face in the future. ✓ CCIM4C does not compete with our strategic plan ✓ While collective impact in year one is gathering data, planning and meeting criteria, the goal in year 2 is to get the monies to implement collective impact. ✓ Collective Impact work will also help us to determine what grants/monies to

<p>Botvin Update</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No new updates. Interest in the program continues to increase. 	
<p>Discussion/Other</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • MHRB is co-sponsoring with the Chamber as part of our Drug-free Workplace an event on March 15, 2018 from 7:30 AM to 9:30AM to address HB 523: Workplace Decisions & Actions to Prepare for Ohio's Medical Marijuana Law. Employers need to have policies to address medical marijuana in place by September 8, 2018. The event will cover choices and options for decision making by employers, taking into consideration topics such as risk and liability. This event is open to the business community and it is requested that coalition members attend if possible. The registration link will be sent out through the coalition group email. • Technical Assistance Training will be held April 10 and 24 (2 day training). There are several employers interested but none have signed up yet. This training has a cost of \$2,500.00 which is sponsored by MHRB making this training free to local employers. • A DATA 2000 Waiver training for physician and nurse practitioners will be held in April. This is 1.5 day training. SRMC will assist in helping to engage the physicians and nurse practitioners to facilitate attendance. • \$10,000.00 was awarded through the Community Action Plan • Marci A., JFS, shared information and asked for our support and participation in the Child Abuse Prevention Month activities scheduled for April.
