Approval of Minutes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Motion to approve Oct 25, 2019, minutes without change was made by David Cotto; the motion was seconded by Shaun Miley. All in favor, motion carried. 	
Prevention	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Youth Summit overview by Beth Dixon: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> A. The Youth Summit consists of Prevention Professionals (lead agencies: Wellsprings, Madison County JFS, Green ESC) who are working together on Youth-Led prevention initiatives on a tri-county level. They brought youth from each of the three counties together to celebrate current youth leadership and provide training/planning opportunities. This is an ongoing initiative through the 2019-2020 school year. B. There were 31 students from 8 high schools present along with their Adult Allies who were there to support and facilitate prevention planning modeled after SPF. The plan requires evidence based formulas with measureable outcomes. C. Funding of \$750.00 per school high school and \$1250.00 per tri-county school was awarded to implement prevention plans. Additional funding will allow for a \$2000.00 budget for each school. They have six months to affect change within their counties. In the spring they will present their work at a tri-county Youth-Led Summit. Community leaders, including school leadership, will be invited to attend. D. Some of the funding will be used to transport the youth and their adult allies by bus to the We Are the Majority Rally in April as well as the registration fees for three youth and one adult ally from each county to attend the Summer Youth-to-Youth Conference <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. <p>Harm Reduction</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> A. One-2-One Year-to-Date stats: B. Needles Exchanged: 11,000. 50% of these were exchanged by individuals that are Hep C+. C. Narcan Kits: 283 distributed D. Lives reported saved by Narcan: 138 E. Treatment Referrals: 51 F. In Treatment or detox: 15 G. Clients: 97 H. Client retention: 69% I. Hep C screenings: 41 J. HIV screenings: 54 K. JJ Peck, Peer Support Specialist: One-2-One and other initiative are about building relationships and trust. JJ is available 24/7, drugs don't take a break and triggers don't run 9-5. JJ calls and checks on clients, making sure they are succeeding in their recovery. One-2-One clients are bringing in syringes they have picked up from local parks and other locations helping to clean up the community. Clients can be assisted with getting insurance through treatment. Treatment facilities information and options are provided at One-2-One. A holistic approach encompasses all aspects of needs not just "you need to stop doing drugs". L. One-2-One will be open on Christmas Day and New Year's Day. Thank you JJ, Kelley and Natalie. M. One-2-One is moving forward in opening a second site. Approval is still pending for the Southern Village Site. Space is being rented to accommodate the program and the anticipated start date is February 2020. If approved expanded services will be offered at this site with the ability to make better connections and integration of services. PREP for those at high risk of HIV will be available through this site and will be provided by Equitas. • Lt. Mori commented that these numbers are significant in showing the efforts being put into prevention initiatives. • GROW – video showing community efforts. To be sent out to group. An additional video is planned with those in recovery for anti-stigma education as well as others. These will be part of Growing a Better Tomorrow. • Drug Death Review, Gracie Hemphill: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A. Confirmed deaths for 2019 as of November 21, 2019 is 34 with an additional 10 pending. B. After the Drug Death Review Team meeting February 27, 2020 we should have a 	

	<p>better idea of the final number of overdose death for 2019. This shows a decline trend: 2017: 106, 2018: 87, 2019: 34 (to date).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> C. Common themes for drug overdose death: History of substance abuse and trauma, both individual and family. D. Trauma Steering Committee is being formed to bring more trauma informed process to Clark County. E. Software: OD Maps. This is an on-line tracking system that is utilized by Law Enforcement and First Responders. It is real-time data, shows any spikes within a 24 hour threshold and includes alerts from surrounding counties. There will be an update on this process in March 2020. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Medicine Disposal Bags: 2000 have been donated by RaliOhio for distribution. 	
<p>Recovery Supports</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Community Center: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A. GED program in partnership with Clark State is up and running. B. Computer room is operational: 10 stations. C. ESL (English as a Second Language) is now being offered D. Daily NA meetings E. Fitness sessions continue and have expanded. F. Possible fundraisers are being discussed G. A new partnership with ODJFS is being developed. ODJFS will have an on-site presence. H. Clark State recently had 11 Peer Recovery Specialist (PRS) graduates. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 1. They are working a limited number of hours each week at the community center. These individuals are looking for other employment opportunities in their field. Discussions are being held with local employers regarding having a PRS on site. Manufacturing is open to the possibility, while direct service employers are a little more hesitant. F. Passport to Recovery Program is still in the creation stage, but progress is being made. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Would include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Instruction on how to fill out a job application b. Training opportunities with completion certificates awarded to place in Passport Portfolio. c. Passport Portfolio can also include items that show compliance with probation, volunteer hours, etc. This can then be utilized as supporting documentation when job seeking. • Art Work/Art Museum: opportunity to take art classes through the museum. Painting classes are also offered at the Community Center. Arts are an excellent way of expressing feelings. • MHRB in partnership with Clark State are still offering Technical Assistance for employers to assist them in developing policies and strategies for employing those in recovery. The event cost to the employer is \$25.00, MHRB is picking up the rest of the cost. The next session is January 14, 2020. MHRB to send out a flyer.

<p>Discussion/Other</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sheri Haines shared that Meth and Cocaine usage has doubled in the last year. Detox is mostly for alcohol and Fentanyl. The hospital now has more beds available; however, if they are full Mercy Reach can work with other hospitals. Alcohol/Benzo withdrawal is the fastest admit due to the effect on the physical body systems and medical protocols. Opioid withdrawal has no medical protocols. There is more mixing of drugs occurring so the need to use Narcan is still there. • 17000 squad runs in Springfield City, highest rate in the state per capita. • Vaping concerns are growing. Pods have many chemicals added. • New Treatment/Detox Facility coming: 80 beds. They are looking to form partnerships within the community. • December 21, 2019, Coat Give away at Clifton Ave. Church of God.
