The purpose of the update is to facilitate communication.</li> <li>2. Background: The Substance Abuse Task Force came out of the Community Health Assessment and the Community Health improvement Plan in 2014.</li> <li>3. Trainings and access to professional memberships have contributed to the growth of the Coalition</li> <li>4. Partnership with the Clark County Combined Health District had strengthened the backbone of the Coalition through:                   <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Structure</li> <li>b. Shared Processes</li> <li>c. Support</li> <li>d. Sustainability</li> </ol> </li> <li>5. Funding initially has come through McKinley Hall to support leadership. New funding source has been secured by the Clark County Combined Health District shifting the role of leadership</li> <li>6. Over time the Coalition has learn what does not work well and grown from it.</li> <li>7. The Coalition is experiencing positive momentum on several fronts.</li> <li>8. There has been some concern regarding a disconnect between the steering committee and the rest of the Coalition. Steps are being taken to rectify this.</li> <li>9. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A new grant funded a bigger capacity role, which is currently filled by Gracie Hemphill, Clark Combined Health District.</li> <li>• A steering committee was created more than a year ago with membership comprised of backbone members. The purpose of the steering committee is to provide direction, develop agenda, move work groups forward, set plans, provide opportunities for coalition members to work on what is important to them, i.e. Prevention, recovery supports, communication, or harm reduction efforts.</li> <li>• Duties of the Steering Committee       <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Strategic Plan</li> <li>2. Determine common goal: development based on strategic plan</li> <li>3. Develop action plans for work groups</li> <li>4. It was shared that Carey is now working for McKinley Hall and will continue to work on efforts she initiated such as GROW and Drug Disposal Bags. Carey has stepped down as the coalition coordinator due to funding. Lt Korge stated we owe Carey a debt of gratitude for her leadership of the Substance Coalition this past year and a half. Involvement</li> </ol> </li> <li>• A link will be sent out to membership, please sign up for the focus group that interests you.</li> <li>• The focus groups will meet between May 28 and June 2. There will be one meeting per day lasting approximately 1.5 hours.</li> <li>• After all the groups have met results will be shared with the coalition.</li> </ul>	

<p>Roundtable</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Lt. Korge: # of overdose trends, Springfield City is currently stable. Concerns people are avoiding going to the hospital or calling 911 due to Covid 19 fears. Runs that are related to overdoses are more critical because calls are coming in to late. This is also true for other emergencies as well. First Responders are very concerned about the number of possible negative outcomes. Messaging should be: Hospital is safe, go to ED, and call 911 if needed.</li> <li>• Data: Check hospital overdose rates daily, run data from city and county. Data will be compared to previous years and information shared with coalition.</li> <li>• Tracey Stute: Naloxone – squads has a sufficient supply. Working on getting high dose Naloxone.</li> <li>• Project Dawn at One-2-One is still distributing Narcan kits. Squads are in need of more One-2-One business cards. One-2-One will be opening a second location at Southern Village. Lt Mori stated this is a very good location for this effort.</li> <li>• Carey and JJ continue to distribute Narcan kits through the GROW initiative.</li> <li>• JJ Peck, Peer Counselor, can train someone, if needed, in their home on Narcan.</li> <li>• FOA meetings have resumed with social distancing being adhered to. Extra rooms are being utilized with no more than 10 people to a room.</li> <li>• Mercy Reach is utilizing telehealth. Group therapy is in office with social distancing guidelines in place. Urine drug screenings continue. Will be fully open starting June 1, with Temperature checks and masks required.</li> <li>• Montgomery County is using an Overdose map that is real time; it's in the initial phase. This programing is on our radar. The topic came up in Drug Death Review. This will be in next year's grant cycle with new funding. The map is by zip code and creates a map showing any spikes. Alerts can be set to show local and other county spikes. This program is nationwide. Information will be need from Fire/EMS for overdoses, both with and without hospital transport. There will need to be agreements with Fire/EMS for release of data. Additionally there are other costs involved that are being evaluated.</li> <li>• Ethan Crossing: Medicaid/Medicare contract for Springfield location still being worked on. Several private insurances are on board with contracts. Currently utilizing sister companies if client has Medicaid/Medicare.</li> <li>• Beth Dixon, Wellspring: 50/50 Program – Two Wittenberg interns to do data dump. Work on reports. There are significant results for Greenon already. Correlate Botvin results with YRBS results to see how they compare. Students/interns created an online post survey for Botvin. This will help with cost and time.</li> <li>• Carolyn Wright has joined MHRB staff as the Assistant Director of Treatment, Thank you for being here.</li> </ul>
